

NYS Poll of Likely Voters: Attitudes Towards Open Primary Reform

#### Methodology

- Online poll of 1,505 likely voters in the state of NY, commissioned by Unite NY, and conducted September 28, 2021.
- The poll has an overall margin-of-sampling error of +/-2.6 percentage points. Error margins are higher for subgroups.
- Slight weights were applied to region, party, gender, age, race, and education.
- Online surveys were password coded so that IP addresses from each device could only participate one.



#### **Executive Summary**


#### Poll reveals:

- Only 38% of likely voters in New York feel "very" or "pretty" satisfied with how the political system works.
- A majority (56%) believe that the system does not work in its current form and needs serious changes
  - Which includes 70% of Republicans and independent/nonaffiliated voters, 42% of Democrats, 61% of Upstate voters, 58% of those in New York City's suburbs, and 49% of folks in the City.
- When asked about open primaries as a solution to the state's dysfunctional political system:
  - 30% say that it could bring about "major changes", another 34% "minor changes", and just 20% "no change at all".
- Three in four voters (76%) agree that "open primaries should allow independent voters to have a say in which candidates advance to the general election"
- More than two-thirds (68%) agree that "open primaries bring freshness to a system that is currently corrupt, stale, and hyper-partisan".
- If a candidate advocated for open primaries to empower voters, 62% say they agree that they are more likely to support that candidate.


### **How Often Vote in Primaries?**




### Description of Voting History




### Right Direction or Wrong Track? OVERALL




### TOP 3 Answers to Why Wrong Track? N= 702






# OVERALL Levels of Trust for Institutions (combined 'a great deal' & 'some trust')




# Level of Satisfaction - NYS Political System -- OVERALL




# Level of Satisfaction – NYS Political System – by PARTY




# Level of Satisfaction – NYS Political System – by REGION




## Who Do You Trust More to Pick Candidates? OVERALL




# Who Do You Trust More to Pick Candidates?— by PARTY




# Who Do You Trust More to Pick Candidates?— by REGION




### Reforms That Would Produce Major plus Minor Improvement -- OVERALL

#### Level of Agreement – Open Primaries Would...

Message Tested	% Combined Strongly & Somewhat Agree
Allow Independent voters to have a say	75%
Are too much of a change from current system	39%
Bring freshness to system currently corrupt	68%
Could bring chaos by voters who know much less	38%
Would lessen incumbent's power to dominate re-election	63%
Reduce power of party bosses	67%
I'd support a candidate that endorses Open Primaries	61%

The job of a Pollster is not only to measure majorities but to examine levels of intensity.

- If NYS had open primaries....30% believe it will make a major improvement VS
   20% say it will not really matter.
- Open primaries should allow independents to have a say in which candidates advance to the general election ballot...40% strongly agree VS. 4% strongly disagree.
- Open primaries bring freshness to a corrupt system...29% strongly agree VS 6% strongly disagree.
- Open primaries reduce power of party bosses...27% strongly agree VS 5% strongly disagree.
